New Meat Processing Facility in Jackson Center



Got Meat, LLC, dba Curly's Custom Meats, has broken ground on a new, state of the art, meat processing facility in Jackson Center. The facility will harvest and process custom and retail beef, pork, lamb, and goat meat. The new facility will include a retail area open to the public for the sale of a large variety of meat, fresh produce, some food items, as well as some non-food items. The project will be adding up to 10 new full-time employees and two part-time employees. The total project investment of building and equipment is estimated to be \$1.4 million. The Village was able to assist the project in facilitating a prime location and assisting with a 15 year, CRA agreement for 100% of the improvements.

Thermoseal Expansion



Klinger Thermoseal is currently undergoing an expansion at its Sidney facility, and they're doing it with the help of the trusted team at Ferguson Construction. Ferguson built the original building back in the 1970s and subsequent additions in the 80s, 90s, and 2000. 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Sidney—#3 U. S. Micropolitan



In Site Selection Magazine's ranking of Top Micropolitans — cities of 10,000 to 50,000 people which cover

at least one county — Sidney, Ohio, tied for the #3 U.S. rank among the nation's 543 micropolitan areas. Ohio once again led as the state with most Top 100 Micropolitans, with 22 tallying enough projects (115) to account for 24% of the state's total.

It is the 12th consecutive year that the Sidney area has made the Top 100 Micropolitan ranking list and this year marks its highest ranking to date. In addition, the Sidney area also made the POLICOM Economic Strength Rating Top 100 list for the 10th consecutive year and achieved its highest rating in 2022.

"It is great to see our community ranked as the #3 U.S. Micropolitan in 2022," said Jim Hill, SSEP Executive Director. "The Site Selection and POLICOM rankings validate that Sidney and Shelby County are great places for corporate investment. We are also the #1 Ohio county for manufacturing employment. Manufacturing output now totals \$9.1 billion in annual shipments. These are exciting milestones to achieve as SSEP celebrates its 40th Anniversary this year!" concluded Hill.

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Shelby County Childcare

The issue of Childcare remains a top priority of Shelby County as we move into 2023. There are several objectives in mind including increasing Shelby County's employed workforce, increasing current kindergarten readiness scores, and providing a safe nurturing environment for all children. The Shelby County Commissioners contracted with 4C for Children in 2021 utilizing federal grant (ARPA) dollars to stabilize current childcare programs on the heels of COVID. In addition, 4C was retained to recruit and train new providers and help with expansions of athome providers and child-care centers.

In 2022, Shelby County was fortunate to retain all current licensed providers. In addition, one home center expanded by adding space for six additional children. Two other entities received licenses with St. Philomena Preschool in McCartyville expanding in August, and the YMCA recently opening a satellite daycare at the local county nursing home, Fairhaven, in November. The YMCA Child Development Center at Fairhaven is licensed for 58 children with their focus on infants and toddlers.

One additional center is currently under construction.

While this is all great news, there still remains a huge need for more providers. Data from 2021 shows that Shelby County had 4,268 children under age 6 with only half in some form of structured child-care. The current barrier for several individuals willing to establish child care facilities is the inability to locate appropriate commercial space. Our ultimate goal is to provide safe, loving care in a developmentally appropriate environment that encourages social, emotional, physical, and intellectual growth in each child. With help from the community, we can work to make that happen for each Shelby County child.

Housing Update

"I'm happy to report that our efforts to improve housing availability are yielding results," said SSEP's Jim Hill. "Housing was identified as a strategic priority in 2018, so it has taken a little time to turn the corner," added Hill.

Housing in Sidney-Shelby County is expanding. In fact, more than 750 new housing units are currently in the works. They include the following:

- <u>Sidney</u>: JDM Dev. 216 apartments on Vandemark
- <u>Sidney</u>: Downtown Units 32 new/ remodeled units

To promote more housing revitalization, Downing Community Advisors



was hired to carry out an 18-month scope of work focused on improving our housing capacity, especially housing revitalization. The new website,

<u>SidneyHousing.com</u>, is a product of the Downing Advisors engagement. Next steps include restructuring of the Sidney Community Improvement Corp. to facilitate revitalization.

"Housing is currently a nationwide issue, and Shelby County is no exception," said Hill. "Our public and private sector leaders are working together to find solutions. Several hundred community leaders throughout the region and state participated in the 2023 Riverway Summit held on April 14 at the Historic Sidney Theatre. Ohio Dept. of Development Director, Lydia Mihalik and Sidney City Manager Andrew Bowsher were keynote speakers at the allday event.

James Shih, VP of Global Operations for SEMCORP provided an update on the company's decision to invest nearly \$1 billion to locate manufacturing and North America Headquarters in Sidney. Shih said, "Our company chose Sidney due to factors such as the quality of the Career Center and career education." He also noted that the shovel-ready site, strong history in manufacturing and the friendlywelcoming community were significant factors.

Shih also commented that the company chose not to begin pouring footers over the winter. They are presently completing the building design and should begin that work soon.
