Francis Manufacturing Expands in Russia

Francis Manufacturing is expanding the company's manufacturing facility in Russia to accommodate growth. The

42,000 s.f. addition will bring the total square footage to 207,000 s.f., including new molding, furnaces and warehousing.

"We are a "job-shop" serving customers all across the U.S.," said Levi Francis of Francis

Manufacturing. "Our employees hand-pour 80,000 pounds of aluminum each week and serve local manufacturers like Superior Aluminum, Crown Corporation and Airstream," added Levi. "Business is good and the phone just keeps ringing, so

our customers."

The company currently employs 170 people and is likely to add 7-10 additional employees with the expansion. H. A. Dorsten of Minster is the general contractor on the project.

Upgrade to Fort Loramie WWTP

After almost five years of planning and construction, a major upgrade to the Fort Loramie Wastewater Treatment Plant is nearing completion with work being done by Peterson Construction. The treatment plant was first constructed in 1990 and had reached the end of its useful life.

The \$11.8 million joint project with the Village of Fort Loramie received funding support with loans and grants from the Ohio Department of Development and USDA's Office of Rural Development. This funding assistance will allow for continued affordable user sewer rates.

The facility currently treats waste from Fort Loramie Lake residents, the Village of Fort Loramie, the Village of Kettlersville, and areas of Newport and McCartyville serving approximately 4,000 people. The new design increased the capacity of the plant from 400,000 gallons per day to accommodate the current average of 600,000 gallons per day, and can withstand peak flows of up to 3 million gallons per day.

Improvements will allow the County to be compliant with Ohio EPA standards pertaining especially to phosphorus and ammonia, and increases the capacity to handle wastewater solids. These design upgrades will allow for planned continued business growth and expansion to the service areas for up to the next 20 years.

Michigan Metal Coatings to Locate in Sidney

Michigan Metal Coatings is planning a 300,000 square foot location in Sidney at 930-990 Vandemark Road. As a part of the project, the company will invest \$20 million in new equipment, creating 60 full-time positions and generating \$3.57 million in new annual payroll. The company is ex-

pected to begin installing equipment and hiring in 2024.

The main driver of the project is to offer better ser-

vices to existing customers, along with continued growth and expansion of the organization, and new customer acquisition based on technology and proximity. Michigan Metal Coatings, headquartered in Port

cess.




Deb McDermott spoke about the launch of the Workforce Partnership and progress over the past 10

Fort Loramie Receives Trail Town Designation

The Buckeye Trail Association recently welcomed Fort Loramie as the 20th Trail Town.

The village of Fort Loramie is an original canal town along the Miami & Erie Canal. It was first established as a trading post by a French-Canadian fur trader Pierre-Louis de Lorimier (Peter Loramie). The indigenous Shawnee people used the post for attacks against the European settlers during the Revolutionary War. The post was burnt to the ground and abandoned in 1782, remaining vacant until 1795. After the victory Bender of The Fort Loram- of the Battle of Fallen Timbers, General "Mad" Anthony Wayne ordered a fort built at the site. The fort stood on the portage

between St Mary's River and Loramie Creek, a half mile north of the present town.

The canal opened in 1841, bringing finished goods to the area, and taking farm and wood products back to the cities. In the early 1900's the canal system had diminished, so the canal system was cleaned up and turned into a community park.



An important feature remaining from the canal days is Lake Loramie, the feeder lake manually

constructed to keep the canal filled with water. It is now a state park and a haven for fishing, boating, camping, and vacationers. Congratulations to Ft. Loramie!
